

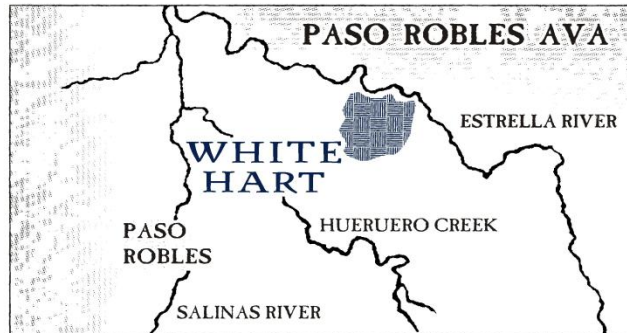

CENTRAL COAST



Paso Robles has been offering the best value in California Cabernet for the last decade. But you have to be careful. Paso Robles has the largest day-night temperature swing of any California appellation, like a bucking bronco.

My family has been farming grapes up and down the Central Coast since the 1930's, so for our Cabernet Sauvignon we knew exactly where to go: to a favorite little spot between two rivers, which keeps the vineyard much cooler than its neighbors. This makes for a smoother, mid-alcohol Cabernet, more Napa-Sonoma than Paso.

The 2011 growing season gave the second small crop in a row throughout the state, including Paso Robles. Here, quality was good, resulting in full body, brilliant fruit, and lively texture – a Cabernet Sauvignon meant for food.

- VINEYARDS: Paso Robles, sustainably grown
- BLEND: 100% Cabernet Sauvignon
- AROMAS: Black cherries, red cherries, blackberries, autumnal spices
- FLAVORS: Dried black cherries, blackberries, licorice, gentle toasted oak, with soft tannins.
- SERVE WITH: Rich stews, roasted meats, main dishes with rich cheese sauces.
- HARVEST DATES: October 23, 2011
- ANALYSIS: Alcohol 13.5%; pH 3.73; Titratable Acids 6.2 g/L; Residual Sugar .17 g/L
- CASES PRODUCED: Fewer than 1,000 cases.
